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# Message from the President

President's Message on the State of the Community Development Job Market

Because of my own personal job experiences in the 1970s I am very much interested in assuring employment opportunities for community and economic specialists and planners. After college, a stint in the military and graduate school I entered the job market in the 1970s at a time of hyper-inflation, malaise and the stigma of being a Vietnam Veteranunlike today where employers want to hire returning veterans for their discipline, dedication and work ethic. Needless to say it was very difficult and often discouraging. Fortunately over the years the employment opportunities for persons in these professions has dramatically improved; especially in larger and medium size communities and at the regional level. Before retiring from my community development position with the City of Rockland in June 2011 I had observed that a number of smaller communities are not being well served by these professions but wish to be but can't either because they lack the funds for full time planning or development staffs or, because the regional agencies are limited in the amount of assistance they can provide pro bono for reason of their own funding problems and limited staffing. In order to assist in filling in this gap I was able to offer affordable services on a part-time contractual basis to the small Maine communities of Thomaston and Kingfield. Quickly, along with downtown master planning work for Waldoboro and Camden I was overwhelmed! Instead of semi-retirement and living off my Navy Reserve and MSRS checks I was back working almost on a full time basis again-this was not in my plans! However, what this demonstrates there is a need out there for professional people like us to assist smaller Maine communities and that this need can be filled by semi-retirees like me or by other persons wishing for part-time employment. Anecdotally, I know I could get more community work if I wanted to hustle for it; but, don't wish to.

After having worked as the City of Bangor's longest serving Community and Economic Development Director **Rodney McKay** has retired from that position. Rod started in that position in 1967. Among his numerous accomplishments over the decades are the on-going downtown revitalization projects, redevelopment of the Bangor waterfront and the City's neighborhood preservation programs.

Matt Eddy, former Economic Director for the Town of Brunswick and for the Cities of Bath and Westbrook has resigned his position with Eaton Peabody Consulting and has started Eddy Consulting Services located in Brunswick. Matt is a long time Maine planner with several decades of experience.

Misty Gorki is the new Town Planner for the Town of Wiscasset. Previously she was the Planning and Development Director/CEO for the Town of Waldoboro where she advocated for the Downtown Village Master Plan. Her replacement is Bill Najpaurer. Bill was formerly in private practice with Renaissance Planning as well as, a former CEO for the City of Gardner and a former senior planner with the Kennebec Valley Council of Governments.

Long time Bath Director of Planning and Development Jim Upham, AICP retired on September 30, 2011 from the City of Bath. He started his career as a town manager in 1973 and his first planning job was on the staff of the City of Bangor--1978 to 1983. Jim was formerly the Executive Director of the Southern Maine RPC and former Town of Sanford Planning Director as well as having worked for the Town of Wells. The new Planning and Development Director is Andrew H. Deci. Previously he was a planner in Spotsylvania County, Virginia.

The City of Belfast has hired **James Francomano** for the newly created Assistant Planner position. Jamie previously worked as City Planner for the City of Presque Isle.

**Brian Hodges** is the Development Director for the Town of Camden. This is a newly created position. Brian was the former Deputy Commissioner of DECD.

**Keith Luke** former Economic Development Director for the City of Westbrook has left that position is now is out on his own. He was in Westbrook for about 2 ½ years.

Rodney Lynch, AICP retired from the City of Rockland after serving for over 13 years as its Community Development Director. Audrey Lovering has replaced Rodney as the Community Development Director for the City of Rockland. Previously she worked for Developers Collaborative of Portland and the Skowhegan Main Street Program.

Darryl Sterling has resigned as the Community and Business Development Director for the Town of Richmond to become the new Executive Director for the Central Maine Growth Council located in Waterville. During his 9 years in Richmond, he was very successful in obtaining numerous grants for the town and well as developing new businesses. His successor is Victoria Bounty. Victoria was most recently a planner with the Midcoast Regional Redevelopment Authority, the organization redeveloping the former Brunswick Naval Air Station. Prior to that, she worked for regional planning agencies in New Hampshire and Massachusetts.

Anne Krieg, AICP has left her position as Bar Harbor Town Planner and was recently hired as the Planner/Economic Development Director for Bridgton. Anne previously served as Town Planner in Reading, Mass., for three and one-half years, and prior to that was Principal Planner in Danvers, Mass., for five and one-half years.

# The Main Street Streetscape project, funde

# The Main Street Streetscape project, funded by a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), will be starting up on April 9

The project is located along a portion of Main Street (Route 197) from Williams Street to Front Street (Route 24) in downtown Richmond. The work involves installation of 33 street lights, along with underground conduit and wiring, junction boxes, light pole bases, electrical service connections and control panels, and replacement of shrubs. The work also includes construction of approximately 475 linear feet of new ADA compliant asphalt sidewalk segments, predominately with vertical granite curbing, along portions of Main Street from Alexander Reed Road to Williams Street and associated construction of paved shoulders, paved driveway aprons, installation of shrubs and street trees, and minor storm drainage improvements. # EFFORTS TO REOPEN THE STINSON CANNERY ARE SUCCESSFUL!

Through a partnership with the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development and the town of Gouldsboro, the Hancock County Planning Commission obtained \$400,000 in CDBG Business Assistance funding to reopen the Stinson Cannery in Gouldsboro as a lobster processing facility. These funds will be used to create 40 jobs as the first step in creating a total of 115 jobs over the next three years. These will largely replace the 128 jobs lost when the Stinson facility, the last sardine cannery in the United States, closed in 2010. The CDBG funds are part of a larger \$8.9 million investment package by Live Lobster Company, Inc. to convert the sardine cannery into a state of the art lobster processing facility.

The facility should be a boon to the local lobster industry since most lobsters are now shipped for processing to plants in Atlantic Canada. A local processing facility will mean reduced shipping costs. It should also boost demand for lobsters. The plant will cook and freeze lobsters and sell them to high-volume customers such as restaurant chains and cruise ship lines. The project is an example of how CDBG funds can be used to retain jobs and boost the area economy.

# 2012 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program

Staff reviewed and responded to submissions for **21 Public Facilities Letters of Intent to Apply**. The total amount requested for the proposed projects is \$3,611,384. The Proposed Budget for this program category within the 2012 program statement is \$900,000. The maximum award per project is \$300,000.

Staff reviewed and responded to submissions for **12 Public Infrastructure Letters of Intent to Apply**. The total amount requested for infrastructure projects is \$4,701,000. The Proposed Budget for this program category within the 2012 program statement is \$2,000,000. The maximum award per project is \$500,000.

Applications for the Public Facilities and Public Infrastructure programs were due March 9, 2012. Awards were announced on April 22, 2012. Congratulations to the following communities who were successful recipients of the 2012 CDBG program.



## HUD's FY2013 Proposed Budget

The Budget Control Act of 2011 sets caps on discretary spending for the next 10 years, which includes \$907 billion in total cuts. The impact on HUD's budget is that it increases gross budget authority by 3% over 2012 levels to \$44.8 billion and maintains housing assistance for families currently receiving rental subsidies.

HUD's top priority for FY2013 is to renew rental and homeless assistance and provide capital needs funding for HUD's public housing stock. To accomplish its priority, HUD proposes the FY2013 budget broken down into three major categories as follows:

Impact of FY2013 budget on three major federal programs:

- CDBG The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program provides funding to five "entitlement" cities,
   Cumberland County, and State of Maine's Department of Economic and Community Development. The FY2013
   CDBG budget is expected to be reduced by another 8% cut over the FY2012 budget of \$9,427,331.
- HOME HOME provides communities with funding to create affordable housing for low-income households.
   Allocations were \$5.7 million in 2011 and are expected to be only \$3.5 million in 2012, representing a 40% reduction.
- Lead Abatement Programs are expected to be discontinued in 2012-2013.
