Prior to his appointment to Presque Isle, Galen served as the youngest Township Supervisor and Board Chairman in Hellam Township's 280-year history. The Maine Development Foundation (MDF) announced that the Towns of Ashland, East Millinocket, Lincoln, Madison, and Millinocket would receive more than a million dollars in grant money. These five towns are directly impacted by mill closures. The funds will be used to redevelop projects vital for the next generation of forest economy. The grants are primarily funded by the Northern Border Regional Commission (NBRC) and the Maine Rural Development Authority (MRDA). The funds will be administered by MDF, which staffs the FOR/Maine (Forest Opportunity Roadmap) coalition.

- Ashland \$150,000 to develop a new Structural Round Timber market on the east coast based in Ashland.
- East Millinocket \$210,000 to stabilize the former Great Northern Paper mill campus, including the repair of several structures
- **Lincoln** \$185,000 to redevelop the Lincoln Paper & Tissue mill site through feasibility assessment and planning.
- Madison \$400,000 to redevelop the Madison mill site through demolition of buildings for a new use of the site by GO Labs for production of wood fiberbased insulation products.
- Millinocket \$216,090 for energizing the substation on the brownfield portion of the Great Northern Paper site.

Maine Economic Development Strategy Plan

The State's 10-year economic development plan could not have anticipated the COVID-19 pandemic. To address the economic future of Maine's businesses, the 40-member committee that helped develop Maine's 10-year plan was split into six (6) subcommittees, as follows –

- Manufacturing and Natural Resources Subcommittee is chaired by Larry Shaw, CEO of MMG Insurance
- Hospitality, Tourism and Retail is chaired by Bob Montgomery-Rice, CEO and President of Bangor Savings Bank
- Education and Workforce, chaired by Jim Herbert, President of University of New England
- Infrastructure is chaired by Susan Corbett, founder and Director of National Digital Equity Center
- Innovation, by Betsy Bremann, CEO of Coastal Enterprise, Inc.
- Health Care, Nonprofits, and Childcare, by Bill Burke, Chair of MaineHealth Board of Trustees

These subcommittee members are tasked with looking at barriers to success; what's stopping people and organizations from re-engaging with the economy and identify opportunities to get back on the growth plan.

Restarting Maine's Economy

On May 8, Governor Janet Mills announced "Restarting Maine's Economy" Plan. The Plan to reopen will be accomplished in three stages. See the table below:

Keep Maine Healthy

The Keep Maine Healthy initiative encourages municipalities and tribal governments to develop education and prevention plans to protect people from COVID 19. Activities proposed under this initiative includes public education; physical distancing and public health support such as fences, tape, and signage for physical distancing; and assistance to local business. Funding will be made available to local officials and tribal governments to assist businesses in addressing safety measures and addressing complaints regarding health violations. On June 26, 2020, Gov. Mills approved almost \$9 million in grant awards to 100 municipalities in its first round of funding. This was followed by an announcement on August 11 of an additional \$4 million in awards to more than 80 municipalities for the second round of funding. Funding Opportunities

Maine Community Foundation announced that it has replaced the Maine Fund for Land Conservation with two new land conservation grant programs. The programs - Conservation For All and Maine Land Protection – provides general support as well as acquisition and easements. The programs support Maine organizations and projects that help Maine people access and connect to the outdoors. Deadline for applications is October 15, 2020. Guidelines and applications can be found online at www.mainecf.org. An information session on the two programs is planned for September 14, 2020 from noon to 1:30 p.m.

Reducing Public Exposure to Indoor Pollutants – The Environmental Protection Agency will be accepting applications until September 15. EPA is soliciting applications to conduct demonstration, technical assistance, training, education and/or outreach projects that seek to reduce exposure to indoor air contaminants by advancing national policy and systems-level initiatives. Relief Programs

MaineHousing doubles its rental assistance from \$500 to \$1,000 through the COVID-19 Rental Relief Program, which began August 3, 2020. The Governor is dedicating an initial \$5 million in Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF) to support the expansion. Under the program, households may receive up to \$1,000 in rental assistance paid directly to the landlord for up to three months. The assistance may also be used to pay for overdue rent.

The Maine Department of Economic and Community Development in partnership with the Maine Small Business Development Centers will provide grants of up to \$5,000 for businesses with five or fewer employees, with an owner whose income is in the low to moderate range. Businesses may use the grant money for working capital, which includes fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable, and other bills that cannot be paid as a result of COVID-19.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program News...

The 2020 CDBG CV19 Proposed Program Statement is now available at <u>www.meocd.org</u>. The CDBG CV19 Relief Funding Budget is \$7,022,416 to be distributed as follows:

The CV19 Housing Expense Assistance Program (HEAP-C) provides funding to address emergency housing needs for low-and-moderate income persons as a direct result of the COVID19 pandemic. Funds will be distributed to each Community Action Agency throughout Maine. The CDBG CV19 Urgent Need Food Security Program addresses community needs of food insecurity by providing funding for operating expenses, program supplies, and distribution activities of the Good Shepard Food Bank, which will benefit low/moderate income persons.

The CV19 Micro-Enterprise Assistance Grant Program provides grant funds to micro-enterprise businesses in non-entitlement areas through a partnership with Maine's Small Business Development Centers. Grants of up to \$5,000 for businesses with five or fewer employees, with an owner whose income is in the low-to-moderate income range are available. The funds are being distributed through Androscoggin Valley Council of Governments, Coastal Enterprises, Inc., Northern Maine Development Commission, and Southern Maine Planning & Development Commission.

Maine's Revenue Forecast

The pandemic has disrupted Maine's economy and threatened the financial stability of people all across the state. An updated Revenue Forecasting Report indicates that the General Fund was revised downward from earlier forecasts by \$523 million for FY20; \$527.8 million for FY 21 and \$883.2 million for FY22/23. The Highway Fund revenues were also reduced by \$30.8 million in FY21 and \$30.5 million for FY22/23. These predictions come as a result of a review conducted in July 2020.

Forecasting revenues due to the COVID-19 pandemic presents an impact on our society not seen in 100 years. The latest report shows a major revenue shortfall and more difficulty in predicting. Current conditions are unprecedented, highly uncertain, and includes a large number of unknown variables. Key assumptions made in making the economic forecasts include a protracted and slow recovery from the current recession and no subsequent outbreaks of COVID-19 cases in Maine forcing a full lockdown. Global concerns in Maine include the closure of the Canadian border, new immigration restrictions and the continuing Chinese tariffs.

Key findings of the latest forecasting report are listed below:

- While there were strong employment numbers in the first quarter of 2020, there were record-setting job losses beginning in April. Projections of an 8.0% decrease of nonfarm employment in CY20 and growth of 4.0% in CY21 and 2.0% in CY22.
- Total personal income was revised downward due in part to the substantial increase in personal current transfer receipts.
- Approximately 60% of the \$238 million reduction in sales and use tax for FY21 is attributable to taxable prepared
 foods and lodging. Lodging sales for the third quarter of CY20 is predicted to be down by 50% as compared to
 CY19. Restaurant sales are projected to be better than lodging sales and are assumed to be down by
 approximately 30%.
- Food sales will improve slowly but is not expected to see the same level as CY19 until CY22.
